DEMIL A Policy Change

Property with a DEMIL Code of A is defined as Non-Munitions List Items (MLI)/Non-Commerce Control List Items (CCLI) – Demilitarization not required. DEMIL A items do not have any offensive or defensive capabilities and are not restricted as with other DEMIL classifications. Because of this, it was decided that DEMIL A property would be systematically archived and title will be transferred to the LEA.

will be considered transferred to an LEA, the record removed from LEEDS, and it will be archived on the DRMS Property Account.

Once DEMIL A Property is on record for one calendar year, it will be run through the Controlled Property Research (CPR) Tool at DRMS HQ. This automated tool verifies the correct DEMIL code associated with a National Stock Number (NSN).

will be removed from LEEDS and archived on the DRMS Property Account. If the DEMIL code has changed, the correct DEMIL code will be reflected, the property will not transfer to the LEA and the property will remain on record in LEEDS.

This policy affects all DEMIL A property regardless of Acquisition Value. Although the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) states property over \$20,000 as high visibility property, title will transfer to the LEA and the record archived. This portion of the MOA will be revised.

As of October 1, 2009, DEMIL A property that has been on an LEA's Property Account for at least one calendar year

If the DEMIL code on the property being considered remains DEMIL A, the property will transfer to the LEA, the property record

DLA Form 1822 Compliance

During the Annual 1033 Program National Conference, the following question was asked, "If an LEA wants to sell a 1208 Program aircraft to another LEA, does the buyer have to complete a DLA Form 1822 (End-Use Certificate) and have a Trade Security Control assessment completed prior to the sale of the aircraft?"

Controls assessment. If the LEA is approved to buy the aircraft through the assessment and through LESO, the aircraft will be removed from LEEDS and archived on the DRMS Property Account.

USML or CCL items to ineligible transferees. These controls include the requirement to notify purchasers of export license requirements and the requirement that purchasers complete end-use certificates. All individuals wanting to acquire Department of Defense surplus property, identified as USML or CCL items, are required to complete the End-Use Certificate (EUC), DLA Form 1822.

The answer is "YES".

DOD Directive 2030.8 requires that Trade Security Controls be implemented whenever United States Munitions List (USML) or Commerce Control List (CCL) property is transferred. Trade Security Controls are implemented to prevent the illegal acquisition or other unauthorized transfers of

All parties who wish to purchase 1208 property, whether they are an LEA or not, must complete a DLA Form 1822 and pass the Trade Security

The Annual 1033 Program National Conference for 2009 was held at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Lake Buena Vista, FL. Weapons Team (Mr. Tom Gawenda and Ms. Kylee Rosso)

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In the coming year, property accountability is a high priority for the 1033 Program Office. This is especially so when dealing with weapons allocated to LEAs through the program. In 2010, LESO will conduct a 100% inventory of all weapons on inventory. It will be required that all serial numbers are verified and reported to LESO within the timeframe allotted. Lost, stolen, missing, or damaged weapons must be reported immediately and an investigation conducted. A copy of the investigation must also be submitted.

In an effort to streamline the process for any

actions concerning weapons, the LESO Weapons Team has created several standard forms. We ask that you take some time to review and use the forms. Please let us know what works and what doesn't. All feedback will be welcomed to make the weapons process better for everyone.

As of December 23, 2009, shotguns are no longer available. Individual letters will be sent out to State Coordinators and LEAs concerning this issue and the prior approvals received.

During the National 1033 Program Conference,

current allotment cap for M-16 and M-14 Rifles was brought up for review. At this time, each LEA may receive a maximum amount of 20% for M-16 Rifles and 20% for M-14 Rifles. The 20% is based on the number of compensated officers. There is a suggestion to increase the percentage to allow for each LEA to receive more of each rifle. Until that decision is made, LEAs who feel they are in need of more than the allocated 20% may submit an exception to policy letter to their State Coordinator for review and submission to LESO.

Aircraft/Watercraft Team, (Ms. Kelly Cuel)

The FAA determines law enforcement aircraft to be public aircraft vice civil aircraft. All public aircraft must be registered with the FAA in accordance with FAA Order 8130.2F. LESO forwards an original DD Form 1348-1A to the FAA Registration Branch each time a 1033 Program aircraft is allocated or transferred to another LEA. All registrations must be documented. LEAs must provide proof of registration to their State Coordinator.

In 2010, LESO will initiate an annual 100 percent inventory of all 1208 and 1033 Program aircraft on inventory. The State

Coordinators will have an allotted amount of time to have LEAs inventory their aircraft, report the status (flyable or non-flyable), provide the serial numbers, and proof of FAA registration. LESO has also initiated an annual verification of the aircraft waiting list. State Coordinators will receive a list of LEAs currently on the list. They will be required to verify that the LEA is still in need of the requested aircraft. This will ensure the accuracy of the waiting list.

1033 Program aircraft are allocated for the sole purpose of law enforcement use. This

does not include transporting celebrities or local officials, attending sporting events (not performing a law enforcement function), or using the aircraft for personal use. All unethical behavior and noncompliance issues will be investigated and handled appropriately. Please review the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for further guidelines regarding 1033 Program property. 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APC/HMMWV/Vehicles Team (Mr. Marcus Loyd)

In December 2009, Vehicles from the M Series were reclassified from a Demil code of Q to Demil F material, which require turn in to a Defense Reutilization and Marketing Office (DRMO) for disposal. This reclassification was initiated by the Department of the Army due to gauges in the vehicles made with radioactive material.

According to Department of the Army Radiation Authorization (DARA) A21-12-04 and TB 43-0216 all fielded TACOM (Tank-Automotive and Armament Command) managed vehicles containing radioactive dials and gauges will have

the instrument panel labeled "**CAUTION RADIOACTIVE. THE GAUGES IN THIS VEHICLE MAY CONTAIN RADIUM-226. REMOVE RADIOACTIVE GAUGES PRIOR TO EXCESS OR DISPOSAL OF THIS VEHICLE IAW AR 385-11, and TM 3-261. REFER TO TB43-0216 FOR ADDITIONAL GUIDANCE.**"

Prior to turn-in of the vehicles to the DRMO, the radioactive dials and gauges must be removed by personnel who have been trained in the removal and disposal of radioactive material. A certification statement verifying that the material

has been removed and disposed of in accordance with local, state, and federal laws must be provided to the DRMO when the property is turned in. It must have dated signatures of the authorized individual who performed the action as well as the dated signature of a witness. Law Enforcement Agencies (LEA) should contact a local Environmental Protection Agency Office for assistance with this action.

The Trussville Police Department in Trussville, Alabama has been using the 1033 program for eight months and considers it a "goldmine for resources". The department has financial constraints due to the current economy and lack of revenue. Sgt. Herb Rosenbaum stated, "I cannot tell you how much

money we have saved our department by utilizing your program plus being able to resource equipment that we otherwise would not be able to acquire."

Through the 1033 Program, the Trussville Police Department have been able to acquire boots, reflex sites for patrol rifles, knee and elbow pads, generators for emergency power and

earth moving equipment to build firearm ranges. They were also able to acquire a general purpose medium tent that they are now using for building searches. It is a great training aid they would not have had if not for the 1033 Program. Sgt. Rosenbaum closes with, "You guys are a life saver for law enforcement!"
