12TH ANNUAL LAW ENFORCEMENT SUPPORT OFFICE NATIONAL TRAINING CONFERENCE

The DLA Disposition Services Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) will conduct a National Training Conference in Seattle from May 1-3, 2012 in order to fulfill legislative (10 USC 380) and regulatory guidance (DLAI 1111 and the DLA to State/Territory MOA). This training conference is intended to train State and Territory Coordinators and Points of Contact, interested Federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies as well as our strategic partners Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD), Department of Justice (DOJ), the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), the US Military Item Managers, and the national law enforcement organizations.

Attendees receive training on program eligibility, available equipment, methods to search for property, program procedures for requisitioning, receiving, transferring, and turning in property, program compliance, property accountability, and the tools and software available to assist them. The conference also assists OSD in researching, developing, testing, and evaluating how well its programs are transferring technology to America's first responder community. The 12th Annual Conference will include a site visit to the DLA Disposition Services Site located at Joint Base Lewis, WA.

FIELDING NEW TEMPLATES

The 2012 National Training Conference will provide discussion time for the fielding of new templates for turn-in, transfer, and property adjustment requests. These versions are available online for review by the State Coordinators and deployment to the LEAs in their respective states.

To avoid confusion on which templates will be required, a version date will be posted on the bottom right of new templates. After fielding, only templates with that version date will be accepted.

While most of the changes to the new templates are related to formatting, the biggest change is to the property adjustment request. We are streamlining and simplifying this form.

Under the current property adjustment request process, LEAs are required to submit a Memorandum for Record (MFR) on the agency's letterhead along with the template. We propose to align this process and its associated template with the other processes by revising the

template and eliminating the additional agency MFR.

When the new template is rolled out, LEAs will select from the most common reasons LEAs request a property adjustment. A drop down box has been added and a reason must be selected to complete the request. While it is not mandatory that the LEAs fill out the form electronically, the drop down box is a way to encourage this practice. The "Additional Comments" box is available for any reasons not indicated in the list.

EAST TEAM LEAD UPDATE

As the Eastern Team Lead for the 1033 Program, I have had the opportunity to meet several new law enforcement agencies while on State Program Compliance Reviews. Most of these introductions are from the training that we conduct while in your state on how to properly use this valuable program. Our business has grown exponentially. This means the word is getting out about how you can requisition equipment that you would normally never be able to obtain. As an additional benefit you and your agency are saving your state and local communities

substantial tax payer dollars. The Eastern Team looks forward to meeting you possibly again and in the future when we visit your state.

The Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) is closer to resolving the Up-Armored HMMWV and MRAP issue that is preventing law enforcement agencies from acquiring these vehicles. LESO is working with our own Disposition Services RTD branch who in turn is working with US Army TACOM who manages the items for the Army to change the policy. This is not something that will happen overnight, but please understand we

are moving forward. Whenever equipment like this is being returned from theater, and is considered excess to the military, LESO would like to see it go to our 1033 Program customers. We exist to support your role as first responders in counter-drug and counter-terrorism operations.

WEST TEAM LEAD UPDATE

LESO has been working with the Joint Equipment Assessment Program (JEAP) and the Defense Accountability Reutilization Disposal (DARD) Facility to find a solution so that Law Enforcement Agencies can return NBC equipment such as Gas Masks, Chemical Suits, Chemical Gloves, Chemical Gloves, etc. back to the Department of Defense. This list is not inclusive, just a broad idea of what will be accepted.

LESO will be providing a list of National Stock Numbers (NSN's) that will be authorized to be returned. This list will be on a document called "JEAP NIIN List 01 APR 11".

Official instructions will be provided in the near future, the basic process will be:

1. Confirm that the items you want to return are on the JEAP/DARD list.
2. Send a request to turn in the items to JEAP/DARD on their form. If approved, they will provide authorization and instructions.
3. Once you have authorization you may request to turn-in items through LESO utilizing standard procedures.
4. LESO will provide a 1348-1a turn-in document; you will need the 1348-1a along with the approval from JEAP/DARD to turn-in the property.
5. The property is shipped to one of the facilities at Barstow, CA, Columbus, OH, or Albany, GA. LEAs are responsible for all shipping cost.
6. Once shipment of approved property to JEAP/DARD is complete, provide documentation to LESO HQ (via State Coordinator) and the items will be removed from the property book.

Please note: Gas Mask Filters **WILL NOT** be accepted.

It may seem like a lot of work but the steps are simple to follow and it is a pretty straight forward process.

Specific, direct guidance will be out soon. If you have further questions we can discuss this at the National Training Conference. I look forward to seeing you all in Seattle.

AIRCRAFT/WATERCRAFT UPDATE



In the first half of Fiscal Year 2012, I had the pleasure of attending the U.S. Air Force Strike Board at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, Arizona and the U.S. Navy Strike Board at Patuxent River, Maryland. I have been asked to speak at subsequent U.S. Air Force and U.S. Navy Strike Boards in the second half of FY12 and am

dedicated to reestablishing critical relationships with the military services in an effort to obtain excess aircraft, according to DOD regulatory guidance.

Federal/State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies interested in acquiring an aircraft through the 1033 Program are required to submit an Aircraft Request form to the Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) Aircraft Lead. NOTE: Aircraft acquired through the 1033 Program are to be used only for law enforcement purposes, including counter-drug and counter-terrorism activities.

TACTICAL VEHICLE UPDATE



As the fiscal year 2011 inventory cut-off date draws closer, we are already looking for pictures of vehicles received in Fiscal Year 2012. As of March 2012, we have allocated over 1,114 HMMWVs to LESO customers. I am asking all State Coordinators to work on getting these photographs rolling in. We will continue to have a member of the LESO staff consolidating these photos for tactical vehicles even after this inventory portion is done, due to the amount of vehicles law enforcement

agencies are receiving on a daily basis.

Since most HMMWVs that are issued have a data plate, each one having a unique serial number, we feel a serial number verification form would assist in the identification of all HMMWVs issued. The new form is already posted on the LESO website, and will become mandatory after the National Training Conference in May. Feel free to begin using the form now to get those law enforcement agencies used to providing us the serial number and photos as soon as they receive their HMMWV.

With this many HMMWVs being issued, the topic of cannibalization is coming up more frequently. Cannibalization is handled on a case by case basis. Several instances have been approved, but there are many

factors taken into consideration - the main one is whether or not the vehicle to be cannibalized could be used for its intended purpose. If you find one at a site that you feel can only be used for parts, submit a memorandum to Cassandra Madden requesting to cannibalize. A specific DTID will need to be provided and sending photos allows us to determine the best course of action.



EAST WEAPONS LEAD UPDATE

We are frequently asked about “the ability to make modifications to the weapons”. Weapons may be modified; however, only non-permanent modifications are authorized. All parts removed must be retained in order to return the weapon to its original condition upon turn-in or transfer. Most of the parts required to modify M16s into a M4 style weapon are available from DLA Disposition Services. See below to get an idea of what can be done...

1033 PROGRAM SUCCESS FROM AVENAL STATE PRISON IN CALIFORNIA...



Items recovered from suspect. In the past twelve months Avenal State Prison has apprehended twelve suspects using Night Vision Equipment received from the 1033 program.

At approximately 0100 hours officers patrolling the perimeter of the institution observed a suspect walking away from institutional grounds. The suspect was dressed in black shoes, pants, and sweatshirt as well as covered in mud. Contact was made with the suspect who stated he was dropped off by his girlfriend because they were fighting.

The suspect had no ID in his possession and admitted to being on prison grounds. The suspect was held pending identification.

Custody staff was able to follow foot tracks made by the suspect and located twenty nine (29) cell phones, ten (10) pounds of tobacco, a forty (40) piece Security and driver bit set, electrical tape, phone chargers, and rolling papers.

Later that morning, two other suspects arrived on prison grounds apparently attempting to locate the first suspect. Their vehicle was stopped and the driver consented to a vehicle search using a K-9 unit. During the search, the K-9, alerted to the front passenger door where a small bindle of marijuana was discovered. The K-9 also alerted to a backpack in the backseat of the vehicle where a marijuana pipe and a methamphetamine pipe were found. All three suspects were arrested and taken to the Kings County Jail where they were booked on several felony charges.

"I should also mention that the first suspect was located due to the use of the Night Vision equipment that we procured from the DLA program. If we didn't have that equipment with us the suspect would surely have gotten away."
